FOR THE APPROVAL OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, APPROVAL SO THAT THEY COULD OPERATE A REHABILITATION CENTER ON THE PIERSON FARM, OWNED BY THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, FOR A YEARLY LEASE OF ONE DOLLAR PER YEAR. FOR THE TREATMENT OF PERSONS WITH DRUG ADDICTION. PRESENT WERE SUPERVISORS MR. FRANKENFIELD MR. HARTSHORNE, MR. MOYER MR. WILSON OUR SOLICITOR, MR. BOOSE CHIEF OF POLICE. AND OFFICERS OF TODAY, INC. PRESIDENT MR. WILLIAM EASTBURN, MR. FORD VICE PRESIDENT, MR. CHARLES MCGURK, PUBLIC RELATIONS, ARTHUR B. SCHULTZ, DIRECTOR, DEB KEIM, A RESIDENT OF TODAY, INC. MR. EASTBURN OUTLINED TO THE SUPERVISORS, THE GOALS THAT THEY ARE TRYING, TO ACHIEVE, AND THAT THE PERSONS THAT WILL BE LIVING AT THE PIERSON FARM ARE THE ONES FURTHEREST ADVANCED TOWARD REHABILITATION, AND WOULD BE NO TROUBLE TO THE COMMUNITY, AS THEY ARE CONSTANTLY UNDER SUPERVISION, AND OBSERVATION. MR. FORD GAVE A TALK ON WHAT TYPE OF PERSONS WILL BE LIVING AT THE FARM, MR. SCHULTZ, THE DIRECTOR STATED THAT THE ONE THAT WOULD BE LIVING AT THE FARM HIGHLY MOTIVATED TO BE REHABILITATED SO THAT THEY COULD AGAIN RETURN TO THEIR RIGHTFUL PLACE IN SOCIETY, DEB KEIM, GAVE A SHORT TALK ON WHAT IT MEANS TO BE A PART OF SUCH A HOME, AND THE FEELING OF BEING WANTED. AND THAT SHE IS RETURNING TO SCHOOL. MR. EASTBURN STRESSED THAT HE WOULD LIKE IF ONE OF THE SUPERVISORS WOULD CONSENT TO BEING ON THE ADVISORY BOARD, AFTER SOME DISCUSSION WE, SUPERVISORS AGREED THAT WE WOULD DIVIDE THIS SERVICE BETWEEN EACH OF THE SUPERVISORS FOR A CERTAIN LENGTH OF TIME AND WITH OUR SOLICITOR AND POLICE CHIEF. WE SUPERVISORS HAD AGREED BEFORE HAND THAT WE WOULD APPROVE THIS REQUEST FROM TODAY, INC. BUT DID WANT SOME MORE INFORMATION WHICH WE RECEIVED, AND WE ARE NOT PUBLICLY SO STATING A MOTION BY MR. FRANKENFIELD TO APPROVE THE REQUEST OF TODAY, INC. TO OPEN A REHABILITATION CENTER ON THE PIERSON FARM. MOTION SECONDED BY MR. HARTSHORNE AND MR. MOYER. MOTION UNANIMOUS AND APPROVAL GRANTED. WE WERE ALSO ASKED BY MR. EASTBURN TO FORWARD A LIST OF NAMES OF RESIDENTS WHO MAY BE INTERESTED IN HELPING THIS ENDEAVOR, TO HELP IN AN ADVISORY CAPACITY AND AS AN AUXILIARY. SUPERVISORS SO AGREED.
